Rally News

O'Donnell's is 300 yards east, just past the 76 Station. We will be meeting in the large parking area at the rear of the building. O'Donnell's opens for breakfast at 7:00 AM if you so desire. Trivia

- * Jerry has had success replacing H4 bulbs with some HID conversions. The price has come down from about \$140 to \$50!

- * Nolte purchased LED backup bulb replacements. Although a "whiter" light, the measured illumination isn't up to incandescent levels.
- * Petter Solberg, left team-less by the withdrawal of Subaru in 2009, placed 2nd and 3rd O'all at Mexico and Jordan. Very good for a privateer against the factory teams.

Cordless lug wrench:

Cordless "rattle guns" make it much easier to change tires. Battery packs can pack serious capacity, and seem to get bigger every year. Ray Damitio was seen carrying the Makita 9.6v cordless drill with a socket adapter at a stage rally in the late '80's. That was a drill, a different tool from the impact wrenches that use a hammer mechanism to torque (or loosen) lug nuts. While a drill motor can hurt your wrist, the hammer mechanism makes changing wheels easy, with the tool doing the work.

Even though they look similar, drills and impact wrenches are vastly different tools. The hammer mechanism is heavier than the gears of a drill. The spinning speed of the impact wrenches isn't even listed for many. Torque ratings are all over the place, perhaps because of the various ways to measure.

"I find it so easy to use the cordless that I often leave the air hose unused, and just change tires with the DeWalt", says Ron Sorem of his 18v DeWalt. "I've got a collection of batteries, so I don't have to worry about flat batteries."

The WAG asked for comments in January. Here are the responses:

Ken Lingbloom: "In looking at Hitachi's tool site, I noticed that they comment that their 18v tools are compatible with THEIR NiCad, ni-MH and lithium batteries. The tool doesn't care what the make-up of the battery is, just the voltage."

Robert Gobright: "As per the recent WAG request I ran out and bought a new cordless impact gun! Actually, I have been wanting one for quite some time. I was getting seriously tired of changing wheels in hotel parking lots with just a tire iron. I had used Ron Sorems' DeWalt and really liked it. I have some other 18V DeWalt tools so the choice was clear. The only thing stopping me from purchasing was the approximately \$280 price tag. I then found that Grainger offers a bare tool version of the gun I was looking for. I already had plenty of batteries and two chargers. I got the DC823B for \$129 plus \$11 shipping. 3/8 drive, 125 lb/ft and 18V.

I have been using my new toy around the shop for a few weeks now and I am pleased. The DC823 has no trouble loosening and reinstalling sixteen 80-lb/ft lug nuts. I got so excited that I even welded an extra nut to my scissor jack. The tool has enough power to lift the car about 3/4 of the way up. After that point the impacting mechanism starts to hit hard. I don't dare holding the trigger any longer for fear of damaging the jack. If you have other 18V DeWalt tools, the DC823 is the way to go."

Tom Palidar: "I searched the internet and found a great buy on a Milwaukee 18 Volt 1/2 in. Drive Impact Wrench. It's been a lifesaver. Makes changing wheels almost easy".

Glenn Wallace: "I had a Harbor Freight one that broke. It was huge, but would break a lug nut loose.

I then got a small Makita 1/2" with LED, it doesn't have quite enough torque to break a nut loose, but you need the lug wrench out anyway to do them up tight, so it does the job and is really well balanced."

Lee Sorenson: "I have a Craftsman 18 volt impact gun. The gun is fine, but the batteries are poor. I carry two-three batteries with and the charger and recharge every night at the hotel at events. Then again, my set-up is 6-7 years old. I have had the batteries rebuilt once at Batteries Plus. Of course they sit unused for months at a time and that cannot be very good.

I think any gun using a minimum of 18-volt batteries should have the torque to do the job. Two batteries are the minimum and consider an inverter for the car to charge on the go.

Prices??????? I have not checked lately. Snap-on was the high end at over \$500. I think my Craftsman set-up was around \$250. I have seen stuff at Harbor Freight Tools for under \$100. YMMV

I also use the gun to operate the jack by welding a lug nut on the end. This operation takes a lot of battery power. If the battery is in good shape, I can easily change four tires and up/down with the jack with one charge. I can swap all four tires in about 15 minutes, by myself."

Marinus Damm: "I have a 28v Li-Ion DeWalt - it's loud as heck, and you have to let it rattle on the lug nut for a bit before it breaks loose (it's always succeeded thus far, though). I might go for the 36v next time, even though it's physically bulkier."
