No Alibi 2018 is on schedule. The route has been measured. About 488 total miles. Everyone's big concern so far is "How much gravel?"

After about the third request, I searched that out, and without any gravel parking areas counted, we are at 23.357 miles of gravel TSD. Beach sand only minimal, depending on your desires. There is no planned gravel transit mileage. Your mileage may vary...

Steve and Kathryn did checkout for Day One. The short and sweet report from Kathryn was "I really like your route!"

Steve is Chief of Controls for this event and will assign checkpoints and crew movements soon after Day Two checkout. We would appreciate your confirmation of availability for volunteering. Send a note to Jim, Steve, or Ron.

The experiment of a Westside ("Wetside") base did not seem to faze the "usual suspects" as registration opened with a flurry of familiar names.

I think I found all of the through route gravel we could use. There is a lot of very long one-way gravel, but we'd rather keep moving and not have a "turnaround" stage. The pavement is twisty, the speeds comfortable and "entertaining", the scenery is great, and you have a chance to drive on the beach.

Raindrop was a success. Interest in No Alibi was encouraging from the novices and part-timers. Our promotion of No Alibi, in the two or so weeks prior to Raindrop, took a backseat. Monday following Raindrop, I hit most of the rally oriented social media with some new pictures along the route and a renewed invitation to join us. We have received a couple more entries.

We have tentatively accepted a seasoned Alcan motorcycle/sidecar team. In conversations they are prepared for anything, and the navigator states, "a regular route book will be fine".

We would like to see more interest in the rally. We have Oregon and Washington represented, as well as a California/New Jersey team. Let everyone know we put on a good show. Please join us.
